2. On the Canvas login screen click on "Parent of a Canvas User"

<u>3. Fill out the info on this screen.</u> Your student will need to enter their username and password. This is mandatory for all students. Please contact Valerie Lodish vlodish@bsdvt.org if you need help with this step.

4. Once you are logged on, you can add addition HMS or BHS students from your Account Settings page.

Message from our Superintendent:

Greetings-

The following changes to the SY 17-18 District Calendar have been made to account for student days lost during the work stoppage in September. These school days are being made up in March rather than June to allow for greater instructional value and to prevent extending the school year.

School will be in session on Tuesday, **March 6** (Town Meeting Day), ending spring break one day earlier for students. Teacher in-service will no longer take place that day.

Thursday, March 22 will now be a full day of school. It was originally scheduled for a half-day followed by parent/teacher conferences.

Friday, March 23 will now be a half-day of school for students followed by parent/teacher conferences. It was originally scheduled as a "no school" day in the District and a full day of conferences.

There will be added time made available for spring parent/teacher conferences to accommodate this modified District calendar. This will happen on a school by school basis.

The tentative last day of school remains **Wednesday**, **June 13th** as originally planned, subject to change if there are snow days this winter. Any snow days that occur will be made up in June. BHS Graduation will still take place on **Thursday**, **June 14th at 10 AM** and will not change.

SOCIAL STUDIES

Earlier in the month, students thought about the way we typically divide the earth into regions: seven continents and 5 oceans. However, when we put the definition of continent to the test ("a large, unbroken land mass surrounded by water") we soon realized that not all continents fit that definition! We considered alternative ways one could regionalize the earth. This led to our Alien Visitor Reports," in which students shared a possible way extraterrestrials could view the Earth's land masses. You can see them on display in the D-Wing hall.

Presently, Synergy students are learning about *absolute* and *relative* direction and how to use




longitude and latitude. Students took on the "cartographer's

challenge:" Can you represent the 3-dimensional earth on a 2-dimensional, flat map?


Partners worked to wrap a styrofoam sphere in a flat outline map of the world. No cutting or ripping was allowed. We soon learned why this is indeed a challenge and why no flat map will ever be able to represent the Earth as accurately as a round globe. We stretched images captured on Silly Putty to better understand the term *distortion* in preparation for learning about different map projections. Here are some essential questions we're investigating as we close out this unit:

- 1. What factors should we consider when using maps and why?
- 2. How and why do people organize (categorize or regionalize) the world to study global issues or problems?
- 3. How and why does a natural hazard become a global natural disaster?

ELA



In ELA, our academic vocabulary word wall is growing! *Analyze, central idea, details,* and *point of view* are just some of the terms we've been learning. We've also started learning some words that have Greek and Latin word roots. It's been especially fun learning the American Sign Language signs for our words. If you see a

Recently, we've turned our attention to informational text. We read an in-depth article in SCOPE magazine about two brothers who escaped from war-torn Syria to start a new life in America. We

talked about text features such as subheadings, discussed the central ideas based on evidence within the text, and have written summaries using key details.

Team Solstice

Science:

Solstice student scientists have been exploring where hurricanes get their tremendous power. We have analyzed data and discovered relationships between hurricane paths, sea surface temperatures, and rainfall. We have investigated angles of solar radiation to explain why temperatures near the equator are generally higher than other latitudes. We continue to explore how thermal energy is transferred from warm equatorial waters to the atmosphere, as we develop our conceptual understanding of the role of heat transfer in global and regional weather patterns. Math

- Seventh graders are working on solving algebraic equations and applying them to solving word problems. The next topic for them will be proportional reasoning.
- Eighth graders are finishing up working on applying solving linear equations. They will then continue their look at linear relationships through graphs and components of a linear graph.
- Some eighth graders are also taking an Algebra Seminar in addition to their eighth-grade math class; if you have a child in this class, feel free to ask them how class is going.
- All students on Solstice continue to improve their ability to work collaboratively through group work each day in class.

Language Arts

- We are finishing up reading, listening and watching eerie short stories. We listened to a story about Francis Brandywine by Dave Eggers; read *The Tell Tale Heart* by Edgar Allen Poe; watched a film version of *The Monkey's Paw* by W.W. Jacobs; and read *The Landlady* by Roald Dahl.
- During the unit, we learned and wrote about point of view and plot structure.
- We identified ways the story was eerie and then analyzed those pieces of evidence.

- We are writing perfect paragraphs about the short stories. Ms. Sawtell provided a menu of prompts to choose from.
- We will be starting our unit around the novel *Brown Girl Dreaming* in late November or early January.

Social Studies

Social Studies students have finished their Geography 101 overview and are examining the political and physical geography of the continents of Africa and Asia. Some good dinnertime conversation starters might include:

- The great migration
- The golden empires
- The European slave trade
- The scramble for Africa
- The "Africa for Africans" movement
- Apartheid
- Sudan, Rwanda and the DRC
- Boko Haram
- The Arab Spring


Team Oasis


