During the month of September, our English Language Arts (ELA) teachers have been administering the Scholastic Reading Inventory (SRI). This research-based reading assessment measures reading comprehension using authentic text. After all the students are tested, the teachers use the data to create interventions that will best meet the needs of individual students. The teachers will also meet in their Professional Learning Community (PLC) to analyze the data school wide and make decisions on future programming and curriculum. During parent/guardian conferences, your child's ELA teacher will be reviewing your child's SRI score and recommending strategies on how you can work with your child to improve their reading comprehension.

Effective October 1, 2019, all students who wish to ride a GMT bus must have a school issued ID or pay for the bus each time they ride. HMS will provide all students who live at least one mile from school with a school ID with the GMT logo. This will be the student's bus pass. <u>Athletics</u>

Welcome to Hunt Middle School Physical Education 1st quarter Newsletter. We have had a great start to the new school year. We have focused on activities supporting team building, working together and supporting and encouraging a positive working environment. Our primary goal is to create a safe environment for all students to participate without the fear of ridicule. Our Physical Education program focuses on skills and activities for life.

Our grading system:

WE have spent a great deal of time going over our grading system with our students, in case of any confusion we want to make sure parents understand as well.

1st and foremost, it is **expected that students bring a change of clothes to PE** class (And change) and wear proper shoes. This counts as **10% of their grade**. In the grading section it will be listed as prepared for class. If your student has a "0" that means they either didn't change or did not wear proper shoes. If it has "100", your child changed and had on proper shoes.

Secondly, **Daily grade**, this translates to **90% of their PE grade**. How this works, Students grade themselves 1-5 (1=55, 2=65, 3=75, 4=85, and 5=95 (+/- 5 on each side)).

A few of the characteristics

Level 1: Irresponsible: Inappropriate behavior, excessive socializing, disrespectful, late to class, name calling, does not participate, not playing by the rules

Level 2: Self-control: cruises in neutral, doesn't participate, is not disruptive, does not call names, does not exert any effort

Level 3: Participant: Participate's, If the teacher is watching, only if they are with their friends, if the activity is near them

Level 4: Self-Responsible: Hustles, puts good effort, maximizes their time, Listens, follows directions, honest and fair, Willing to try and involved in the activities

Level 5: Caring: All of level 4 and Helps others, supports students positively, compliments others, helps others, sets up or cleans up equipment. Includes everyone in the class willingly.



Science

Students kicked off the year by identifying themselves as a Resident Expert in a topic or skill. Students introduced themselves as Resident Experts by making posters, which they shared and commented on in a Digital Resident Expert Convention. Ask your child to show you our private community of experts on <u>cluster.co</u>.

Presently, Solstice scientists are learning about neurology and neuroplasticity as they piece together the answer to the question, "What happens in my brain when I learn?"

Our next topic of study will incorporate Geology and Paleontology as we examine evidence of Earth's history and changes to Earth's surface over time.

Math

- Our seventh graders have begun our investigation of operations with positive and negative numbers; in addition to the basic operations, we also discuss topics like absolute value, properties of operations, and prime factorization.
- Our eighth graders have begun the year with some practice in collecting data and making conclusions based on the data. We will use that knowledge at various points in the year in connection with some goal-setting work we will be doing. Next up is a big investigation of linear relationships, such as calculating slope and intercepts, writing equations in different forms (slope-intercept, standard, and point-slope), and applying that knowledge to word problems. We will apply and extend that knowledge to look at graphing one- and two-variable inequalities, as well as solving systems of inequalities.
- Eighth graders will have the option of taking an additional Algebra Seminar the second half of the year; student contracts are being handed out now and must be returned in order to be eligible for this course.





Language Arts

- Students finished up their hopes and dreams projects, which will be displayed around our classrooms.
- We are learning about the parts of a graphic novel and how to read them. Students are learning that a graphic novel is different than a comic book, that oftentimes, we have to dig deep, make inferences and look at the pictures for clues.
- Students researched important events during the Civil Rights Era to help us build background knowledge for our all class read of the graphic novel *March. March* tells the story of the birth of the Civil Rights era from the point of view of Congressman John Lewis. We will travel to the Flynn on October 8 to hear him speak.

Social Studies

Students are off to a great start in Social Studies this year! The plan for the year: we have begun with a unit on geography skills. We'll follow-up by studying the geography of Africa and Asia. By the second quarter we should be studying ancient history including the Sumerians, Egyptians, Greeks, Persians, Rome, China, and India. Your student recently took a quiz on some of the basics on the world map. You should have seen this map as they were assigned to study it near an adult who could guide effective study techniques. If you haven't seen the quiz, ask them how it went or log on to Unified Classroom which you will find linked to the <u>Hunt website</u>. Also know that they are watching the always entertaining <u>Geography Now</u> videos on Youtube. Feel free to follow along; it may make for some nice dinner-time conversation! Ecollect Student Update

NOTICE: Due to problems with Powerschool our deadline has been extended to Monday, September 30. If student information is not updated by then, that student may not be allowed to return to school until their update is complete. If a student without updated information comes to school on September 30, they may be sent home.

It is time for you to complete the online Annual Student Information Update (now listed as Ecollect Forms in Powerschool) for your student. The form asks you to update critical information, such as emergency contact information, medical information, etc.

Step 1. **If you already have an account in Powerschool,** sign into your Powerschool account. After you have signed in:

- a) Look for your student's name as shown on the bar in the upper left corner;
 - i) click on the student's name
 - ii) then click the Ecollect Student Update Form and then start with the form called "A. Introduction" and complete the information.
 - iii) It will take you through each form. Make sure to complete every form.
 - iv) Once you finish with this student, move on to the next student by clicking on their name on the bar in the upper left corner. All students must be updated one at a time.
 - v) Done!
- b) **If the names of other children name do not appear**, you must next call your child's school and ask for their "Access ID and Access Password"





Then again, in Powerschool, go to:

- 1. "Account Preferences" on the menu on the left side,
- 2. then click on "Students",
- 3. then "Add Student."
- 4. Enter your student's name, their Access ID and Access Password.
- 5. Then select your relationship to your student through the Relationship drop down.

Step 2: If you are not certain if you have a powerschool account, follow these steps:

- 1. Go to bsdvt.org or to your school's home page.
- 2. Click on this image in the upper right hand corner of the webpage:



- 3. Enter your username and password.
- 4. Follow the steps for "Forgot Username or Password?" if needed.
- 5. **If you have never created a Powerschool account,** instead call your school and ask for an access ID and Access Password; when given these, click on create account, and enter the ID and Password as directed.
